Parkland For Everyone

Berkeley and the London Wildlife Trust have been working together to enhance the green spaces across Kidbrooke Village. Berkeley are creating an interactive playspace set within a biodiverse and wildlife friendly parkland for everyone to enjoy.

Berkeley are working to create a unique playspace within Kidbrooke's parkland, enhancing the interaction with green spaces for everyone to enjoy.

Since the launch event in October 2016, the London Wildlife Trust have run a number of events surrounding the wildlife and benefits of evolving the green spaces at Kidbrooke. The London Wildlife Trust events include; weekly 'Wild about Kidbrooke' events, wildlife workshops for local schools and monthly meetings with local community groups.











Kite Park

Earth sculpting shapes the area to create a symbolic source of the chalk stream containing a themed play area for the wider Kidbrooke Village community.



Heathland

Sculptural mounds around the existing mature trees create kidbrooke heath and form a tandmark destination including lawn terracing, seating steps and a small amphitheatre



Chalk Stream

Creation of high quality habitats including aquatic marginal planting and species rich meadows by the existing waterbody. Large open lawn areas formed centrally to allow flexible use of space, small events and gatherings.



Wetlands

A London Wildlife Trust branded nature pavilion and education trail though interlocking wetland habitat creates the stepping stone for people and wildlife to Sutcliffe Park.





Building Communities

Since work began in 2009 more than 1,500 people and families have opened the door to a brand new home. Kidbrooke Village is lucky to have so many energetic people and organisations taking an active role in community life.

We have been working collaboratively with local residents, community groups, businesses, local schools, affordable housing providers and the Royal Borough of Greenwich to make this a welcoming and inviting place where people from all walks of life love to live.

Together, we have already come a very long way. Our aim now is to harness the talent and efforts of everyone involved to create a community which is connected and established for the long term.

The Berkeley approach to building the community in Kidbrooke Village involves active participation of residents and partners who may engage at different levels. Rather than a linear process, we see our approach as a flow which journeys between each stage according to the learning and evolving needs of the community.


